Sundays at 8 AM (in the Chapel), 9 AM (in Wesley Hall), and 11:15 AM (in the Sanctuary) Wednesdays at 7 PM in the choir loft of the Sanctuary

Ash Wednesday (March 6 at noon and 7 PM)

The season of Lent—40 days of preparing for Easter—begins on Ash Wednesday, this year on March 6. Join us in worship in the Chapel at noon for an abbreviated worship service or in the Sanctuary at 7 PM for a worship service including music and Holy Communion. Both worship services will include the imposition of ashes as a sign of our mortality and intent for our hearts and lives to be changed.

Palm Sunday (April 14 at 8 AM, 9 AM, and 11:15 AM)

Join us as we wave palm branches, sing praise to God, and begin our Holy Week journey, remembering Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem. On this festival day this year, the BW Singers will participate in our 11:15 AM worship service, at the conclusion of Baldwin Wallace's annual Bach Festival. Please join us.

Maundy Thursday (April 18 at 7 PM)

On Thursday of Holy Week, join us in the Sanctuary to remember Jesus' last supper with the disciples and the commandment Jesus gives us to serve one another through tangible acts of love. Worship will include music and Holy Communion.

Good Friday (April 19 at 7 PM)

With the Berea community, we will gather outside our building at Noon for a crosswalk through downtown and then in our Chapel at 1 PM for a worship service to remember Jesus' crucifixion. Then, at 7 PM, we will gather again in the Sanctuary for a service of scripture and song.

Easter Vigil (April 20 at 7 PM to April 21 at 7 AM)

As Holy Saturday turns to Easter Sunday, you are invited to come to the Sanctuary to wait and pray, as Jesus instructs the disciples to do while he prays in the Garden of Gethsemane. Sign-up sheets will be available in the weeks before this weekend for you to sign up for a time to pray silently in the stillness of the Sanctuary.

Easter Sunday (April 21 at 8 AM, 9 AM, and 11:15 AM)

Easter is the central celebration of the Christian year. Join us in worship at 8 AM or 11:15 AM in the Sanctuary, or at 9 AM in Wesley Hall as we celebrate Jesus' resurrection and the beginning of the Great Fifty Days of Easter through scripture, song, and sharing Holy Communion with our Risen Lord and God's Easter people.

2019 Cambodia Mission Trip



For two weeks in January, six members of our community—Anita Evans, Megan Howe, Nathan Howe, Greg Rentsch, Olivia Rentsch, and Kevin Scaife—joined with members of Westlake UMC and Jefferson UMC to minister among our sisters and brothers in Cambodia.

We began our journey in Phnom Penh, worshiping with Methodists at a local church in the capital city. Before leaving Phnom Penh, we toured a genocide museum and one of the "killing fields," stark reminders of the Pol Pot regime which killed between one-quarter and one-third of the entire Cambodian population between 1975 and 1979.

After Phnom Penh, we traveled to Banteay Meanchey, a province located in the northwest of Cambodia, bordering on Thailand. There, we met with pastors and laity in leadership from local congregations, sharing ideas about worship, Sunday school classes, and mid-week programming. We were blessed by the commitment and enthusiasm we witnessed there, in a place where Christianity is very new and still very rare.

We then traveled to Siem Reap, where we visited three of the temples of Angkor Wat, a temple complex built in the 12th century. From Siem Reap, we continued southeast to Kampong Thom, another province, where we met with high school students living at a dormitory on the grounds of a Methodist church. We also participated in two days of "vacation bible schools," sharing stories about Jesus and playing games with local children.





Throughout the experience, we were inspired by the faithfulness of the Cambodian people and the compassionate approach of our United Methodist missionaries. The United Methodist Church is committed to improving access to education and to improving women's healthcare, and we were grateful for the life-changing opportunity to participate in this meaningful ministry. Please ask any member of our team for more information about our experiences in Cambodia, and please prayerfully consider coming and joining us the next time we go, currently planned for January 2021.

The new 2019 UMW books have been shelved in the library, and one of the most visionary compositions for social justice is Where Do We Go From Here: Chaos or Community? by Martin Luther King, Jr. Dr. King published this book less than a year before his tragic assassination in 1968. In this book he emphasizes the need for social, economic, educational, and political equality for all minority groups, not only the black community. In his opinion, the goal of complete freedom for everyone, including the white population, can only be brought about through

nonviolent action for total integration. He states that separatist movements, like the "Black Power" movement, and violent riots will only divide and segregate our country further. He points out specific obstacles to justice in our country, as well as his own proposals to eradicate poverty. As Coretta Scott King says in the "Forward", "It is our common tragedy that we have lost his prophetic voice, but it would compound the tragedy if the lessons he did articulate are now ignored."

THIS WINTER, USE THE RIGHT S.A.L.T.

If you need to use salt on your driveway or sidewalk this winter, to protect our waterways according to the Cuyahoga Soil & Water Conservation District, it's important to keep these tips in mind.

S - Road **S**alt (sodium chloride) only works above 15 degrees Fahrenheit so use sand for traction or use an ice melting product made for colder temperatures.

Amount - One 12 oz. cup of salt can cover about 10 sidewalk squares. Don't use more than is needed.

Location - as makes sense, only apply salt on your driveway or sidewalk, not your lawn or near trees.

Time - Salt works best when its applied before snow falls or right after snow is removed from the driveway or sidewalk.

- The Office Staff has the right to edit submissions, ask for additional information, or refuse to print. The staff will refuse to print items which would violate copyrights.


CALENDAR INFORMATION



For March 11, read Killer of the Flower Moon: The Osage Murders and the Beginning of the FBI by David Grann. A true-crime story begins in 1921 with the murder of a Osage woman named Anna Brown. The Osage, driven from their land in Kansas to a rocky, untillable parcel in Oklahoma, ironically had become the richest people per capita in the world due to vast oil reserves under their land. But most Osage, like Ana, were deemed "incompetent" to manage their wealth and so were assigned white "guardians" to do so. And when a white man married an Osage woman, he had control of the funds. It's not a leap to see that this system invited abuse – and far worse. By 1923, 24 Osage had been murdered, along with several people investigating the crimes. It was all about the money.

For **April 8** read **Small Great Things** by Jodi Picoult.

A labor/delivery nurse at a hospital has a family who refuses her service. This book tackles race, privilege, prejudice, justice, and compassion- and doesn't offer easy an answer.

LENT FAITH FORMATION

BEGINNING WITH ASH WEDNESDAY, MARCH 3

Prayerfully consider how you might grow in God's grace this Lenten season. It is helpful to let Pastor Carrie know which classes you plan on attending so books may be purchased ahead of time.

Sunday Groups (10 AM unless otherwise stated)

- Animate (RM 12) will begin "Bible", the last in the Animate series, led by Claire Powell. Whether or not you've taken an Animate course before, you're welcome to join us! This is an ideal class for those curious about the Bible and it's place in faith life, whether new or experienced in Bible study.
- *Disciples Path* will be offered by pastors during this season as well. The class encourages participants to deepen their relationship with Christ and the Church. This class is recommended for those considering joining the church.
- 9 AM Lectio-Divina (Parlor) continues to meet and welcomes new friends. What is Lectio-Divina? It is a spiritual practice of scriptural reading, meditation and prayer intended to promote communion with God and to increase the knowledge of God's word. It does not treat scripture as texts to be studied, but as the living word. The group reflects on passages from worship that day.
- Homebuilders (Parlor) will present the study, **Entering the Passion of Jesus** by Dr. Amy-Jill Levine. The study will walk through the last days of Jesus, with context for time, place, and culture. Come to discover more about Jesus' last week, and more about our own faith journeys. Class will be led by Linda McCowen.
- *FaithLink* (Library) will continue to meet and discuss current issues from a faith perspective. Come for respectful conversation and insight from your faith community.
- *Parents Group* (Parent's Cottage Rm 25) is for parents of tots teens, meets on the second floor each week. Come for support, encouragement, and a bit of laughter as we all journey together in this calling of parenthood.
