On **Maundy Thursday**, named for the command or "mandate" Jesus gave the disciples to love one another, we gather to remember Jesus' example of servanthood and to celebrate the last supper Jesus shared with his friends. The worship service concludes with the ancient practice of stripping the altar table as a dramatic demonstration of Jesus' abandonment during the events of this night and Good Friday. Our gathering this evening begins a three-day continuous worship service (Triduum), including Good Friday and concluding on the evening of Holy Saturday.

First Reading—John 13.1-7, 12-16, 34-35 (CEB)

¹ Before the Festival of Passover, Jesus knew that his time had come to leave this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them fully.

² Jesus and his disciples were sharing the evening meal. The devil had already provoked Judas, Simon Iscariot's son, to betray Jesus. ³ Jesus knew the Father had given everything into his hands and that he had come from God and was returning to God. ⁴ So he got up from the table and took off his robes. Picking up a linen towel, he tied it around his waist. ⁵ Then he poured water into a washbasin and began to wash the disciples' feet, drying them with the towel he was wearing. ⁶ When Jesus came to Simon Peter, Peter said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?"

⁷ Jesus replied, "You don't understand what I'm doing now, but you will understand later."

¹² ...After he washed the disciples' feet, he put on his robes and returned to his place at the table. He said to them, "Do you know what I've done for you? ¹³ You call me 'Teacher' and 'Lord,' and you speak correctly, because I am. ¹⁴ If I, your Lord and teacher, have washed your feet, you too must wash each other's feet. ¹⁵ I have given you an example: Just as I have done, you also must do. ¹⁶ I assure you, servants aren't greater than their master, nor are those who are sent greater than the one who sent them....

³⁴ "I give you a new commandment: Love each other. Just as I have loved you, so you also must love each other. ³⁵ This is how everyone will know that you are my disciples, when you love each other."

A Feast of Love

Whenever we "break bread" together as church, we remember that Jesus invited folks to gather for meals throughout his ministry, not just as part of the "last supper." So, during this season of "social distancing," we wanted to create a way for all of us to break bread together on this holy evening, using whatever we have already in our homes. You are invited to have some food or beverage with you now as we continue.

Jesus used the parable of a great banquet to which all people are invited as a way to talk about God's dream for this world. He told us to "go to the highways and back alleys and urge people to come in so that my house will be filled" (Luke 14.23). Often, he invited the least likely guests to his meals, confounding the disciples and others. In this way, he encouraged a deep love and connection beyond our social "norms." He knew that we need connection and inclusion, at once comforting us, saying, "You have a place at the table," and challenging us to make sure that we are doing the same for others: extending our tables, our hearts, our communities, so that all are welcomed and affirmed.

It is difficult in this moment not to be near some of those whom we love and about whom we might be concerned. Take a moment now to pause and say out loud the names of people you wish were right there next to you at your table today....

Jesus is no longer physically with us when we gather, and yet, every time we gather around a table or gather in worship, Christ is present with us. So, too, our loved ones are with us now.
