First Lesson—Genesis 18.1-14 (*CEB*)

¹The Lord appeared to Abraham at the oaks of Mamre while he sat at the entrance of his tent in the day's heat. ²He looked up and suddenly saw three men standing near him. As soon as he saw them, he ran from his tent entrance to greet them and bowed deeply. ³He said, "Sirs, if you would be so kind, don't just pass by your servant. ⁴Let a little water be brought so you may wash your feet and refresh yourselves under the tree. ⁵Let me offer you a little bread so you will feel stronger, and after that you may leave your servant and go on your way—since you have visited your servant."

They responded, "Fine. Do just as you have said."

⁶ So Abraham hurried to Sarah at his tent and said, "Hurry! Our connectional leaders "recognize that racism and injustice are deeply embedded and vexing issues within our Church and our communities" and commit themselves to "take action, to learn together, and to continue to press forward in transforming our Church, our communities, and our world into the 'beloved community.'" We echo and affirm the expressed commitment of our Bishop and members of the Extended Cabinet, and we invite you to join us in an intentional period of self-examination and learning conversations, trusting that if we are to be peacemakers in this world (cf. Matthew 5.9), then we must be willing to begin that process of transformation with ourselves. Here are some of the ways we invite you to join us in this journey:

Learning Conversations

All are invited to join us on Zoom for a series of weekly videos and conversations about racialized injustice and what we can do to resist this injustice, both in ourselves and in our communities. We will be utilizing a resource from the General Commission on Religion and Race of our United Methodist Church, and the tentative schedule for these conversations will be:

- Monday, June 15, 7 PM: "Deconstructing White Privilege"
- Monday, June 22, 7 PM: "Building the Beloved Community"
- Monday, July 6, 7 PM: "Meaningful Conversations on Race"

- Monday, July 20, 7 PM: "Intersections of Oppression"

Summer Book Club: *Grace Will Lead Us Home* by Jennifer Berry Hawes *Monday, June 29 at 6:30 pm*

On Monday, June 29 at 6:30 pm, all are welcome to join us for a discussion of the book, Grace Will Lead Us Home: The Charleston Church Massacre and the Hard, Inspiring Journey to Forgiveness, by Jennifer Berry Hawes. (Our meeting location—whether in person or online and by phone—will be determined closer to the date of our meeting; please contact Pastor Nathan to express your interest in participating so that you can be kept informed.)

Five years ago, on June 17, 2015, twelve members of the historically black Emanuel AME Church in Charleston, South Carolina, welcomed a young white man named Dylann Roof into their evening Bible study. Nine of them were shot and killed by Roof in an attempt to start a "race war." Two days later, relatives of some of those who had been killed stood at Roof's hearing and offered forgiveness, but that offer of forgiveness was just the beginning of a long journey toward healing. In Grace Will Lead Us Home, Pulitzer Prize-winning local journalist Jennifer Berry Hawes provides a definitive account of the aftermath of this tragedy, sketching a story of how a community begins to heal.


Parents Book Study: Raising White Kids by Jennifer Harvey June 30, 7 PM - Please express your interest using the link below.

As we're watching and praying for our country as we realize the deep pain our brothers and sisters of color are experiencing, some of us have begun to talk with each other about how do we raise kids in all of this. How do we raise them to make a difference? What do we even say about race? When and how do we talk about white privilege?

I have found *Raising White Kids* by Jennifer Harvey (available on Amazon), very helpful and a great starting point for group conversation. It comes from the perspective of parenting "race consciously" as opposed to teaching color-blindness. It is the hope that with teaching race consciousness, kids will be able to point out and help end racism in their communities. Other topics include healthy white identity, privilege, what valuing diversity means, and more. It would be helpful for parents of any stage, and caregivers and teachers as well. If you have friends you want to join us, just let me know.

We're hoping to do this on Tuesday, June 30th at 7 pm, on the Facebook parent page (UMCB Parents) using the "room" function to have a discussion. If you're putting littles to bed and need to come on later, that's ok. We want to have ample time to talk without a zoom time limit.
