


BOOK DISCUSSION: CASTE: THE ORIGINS OF OUR DISCONTENTS

Well ingrained in our Wesleyan heritage is the practice of coming together in small groups for fellowship, discipleship, and mission. As we weather this storm of a pandemic, and look towards a brighter future, we encourage you to consider this kind of small group community.

On the next page, you will find types of "House Churches" that we'd like to help you organize. The idea would be for you to safely begin meeting either online or outdoors, while weather permits. As we ease out of physically distancing ourselves from each other, the hope would be that these strengthened community groups will stay together.

How are house churches different from small groups or topical classes? In some ways, there's much similarity. However, we are recognizing our need to be together in different ways during this season. While we won't be able to gather as a whole congregation for some time, we are still, the church together and apart. We can be together in small groups and still be and experience the Church, or experience belonging to the Beloved Community.

Your house church will have a culture and rhythm of your group's creating. Perhaps you'll gather online once a month, and in-person once a month. Or perhaps you'd like to talk weekly. For now, we'll help organize a few households together based on their desired focus for their house church. Complete the form **on the next page** or **online at** http://www.umcb.org/adult-formation-interest-form/ and we'll help get you connected to a house church.

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"Coffee Fellowship" - This type of group comes together to check-in and care for each other. To hear each other's prayer concerns and joys and perhaps discuss the Scriptures or message from the week's worship.

"Nature Appreciation" - We have many in our congregation who enjoy walking in the park, observing nature, and reflecting on God's beauty in creation. This group may choose to walk together and/or find a book study specific to nature, ecology, or environmental care.

"Book Discussion and Series" - This group may choose to read and discuss a book together or use video content from our subscription to Amplify Media (this is like Netflix for UM churches). We already have two of these groups meeting - one on Sunday morning at 10 am, and a Women's Bible Study. We'd love to see more communities like this come to fruition.

"Disciple Fast Track" - For those desiring to really dig into the heart of Scripture, consider joining a small group of friends to study a vast majority of the Bible over the next year. This 24-week session may be divided up over the year. Videos will also be available on Amplify Media.

"FaithLink" - Our long-term small group welcomes new friends to join in the conversation around faith and current events.

Please note that any house church that chooses to gather in person should follow all health guidelines provided by the CDC, including face coverings when indoors or when distancing of 6-feet is not possible. Please meet online, by phone, or outdoors until we reach a level 1 or 2 emergency level.

IN-PERSON INDOOR WORSHIP RESUMING SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 6, 9AM, WESLEY HALL

While Cuyahoga County's Public Health Emergency Risk Level remains at Level 2 or lower, we will plan to resume limited-capacity in-person Sunday morning worship services at 9 AM in Wesley Hall, beginning September 6. If you are ill, experiencing symptoms related to COVID-19, or recently have been in contact with someone experiencing symptoms, please stay at home and join us for our online worship service at 11 AM. My shared morals, instilled by community and family leaders of the past, have led me to my role as Activities Assistant at Aristocrat Berea. AB is licensed as an LTC and Rehab Center; Mental health is not excluded, some folks would pass on without equitable treatment. My main role is to provide socio -emotional support and decrease harmful behaviors through recreational games such as Bingo, journaling, arts and crafts or cooking classes. Ultimately, this is part of my work on Earth; I've found my niche career topic.

We're are looking for a strong core group of up to twelve folks initially, to kickstart our pen pal program. If you are fluent in Spanish, Russian or German, your help would be immensely beneficial (write language on outside of the envelope). All twelve participants will write a starter letter addressed anonymously; matches will be picked at random by residents, read privately and a written response will make it back to you shortly. An element of suspense and something to look forward to; a light of hope. It breaks my heart to tell you that a handful haven't had visitors in over three years. Reportedly, it's the simple love of a neighbor they miss.

For the children and young adults that want to get involved, I have one suggestion: Your new friend would love to answer a "Would you Rather" question. Like, would you rather have a brand new kitty or puppy? Music is also very important. Maybe you could talk about what makes your favorite song so special?

It was great to meet new friends and share first-day snacks with our neighbors!
