Please consider giving generously on Human Relations Day.



BLESSING OF HOMES POST-EPIPHANY (BEGINNING JANUARY 6, 2021)

In some parts of the world, there is a Christian custom of inviting God's blessing on dwelling places, including both homes and workplaces, and upon all who live, work, or visit there. Along with prayers for God's blessing, the front or main entrance is marked with chalk as a sign and reminder that we have invited God's presence into our homes.

This tradition is rooted in the visit of the magi to the place where the Christ-child resided (Matthew 2.1-12), and so it is most appropriately practiced near or during the season after the Epiphany, on January 6.

UMW'S MISSION OF THE MONTH: CHURCH STREET MINISTRIES

Fran Millword founded Church Street Ministries (CSM) in 1986. Those who needed a second chance, including food and clothing were served; the mission grew to include furniture and other goods and is currently located at 1480 Bagley Road.

Church Street Ministries' food pantry is the 4th largest Cleveland Food Bank Distributor. In 2019, CSM served 13,339 people and 160,068 meals. The Second Mile Thrift Shop (furniture, clothing, toys, and household goods) supported 134 families and 23 veterans.

CSM has graciously participated in our last 3 Craft and Mission Fairs by providing an information table and goodies to sell. A portion of our gift basket profit (30%) is earmarked as our donation to Church Street Ministries. UMW sponsors a pasta shelf in the pantry and our Morning Circle has joyfully donated food to keep the shelf well stocked. Last Thanksgiving, UMW donated 10 turkeys and food for dinner. Due to the cancellation of our Fall Craft and Mission Fair, UMW donated \$300 to help support the food pantry.
