Palm Sunday March 28, 11AM

Palm/Passion Sunday begins Holy Week by embodying its sharp contrasts. In the palm procession, we experience the joyous inaugural parade of Jesus as he enters Jerusalem. In the concluding reading of the Gospel, we are confronted by the story of Jesus' passion or suffering. By the sharp contrast, we are reminded of our various seasons of faithfulness: that our lives of faith are filled with both suffering and joy, times of following Jesus closely and times of falling away. Yet in every season, God's love for us remains steadfast.

Maundy Thursday April 1, 7PM

On Maundy Thursday, named for the command or "mandate" Jesus gives all disciples to love one another, we remember Jesus' example of servanthood and celebrate the Lord's Supper. The worship service concludes with the ancient practice of stripping the altar table as a dramatic demonstration of Jesus' abandonment during the events of this night and Good Friday. Worship on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday are celebrated as one continuous worship service.





Good Friday April 2, 12PM and 7PM

Good Friday is the second of the Great Three Days—or *Triduum*—consisting of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.

The 12PM worship service on this day will focus on the "seven last words" spoken by Jesus from the cross and will be a collaborative effort of the Berea Area Churches; this worship service will be live streamed at www.facebook.com/BereaAreaChurches/live.

You are invited to participate in a "virtual crosswalk" that will be part of this 12pm worship service by submitting to Pastor Nathan (nhowe@umcb.org) pictures or short videos of crosses around town. Think of a location in our community that holds significance for you--e.g. outside your home, at one of the parks, by the lake, somewhere on campus, near a church building or other significant building, etc.--and take a photo of a cross or yourself or your family with a cross at that location. Consider submitting a photo of a cross that decorates your home, either in your home or out at some place in our community. These images will be incorporated into our Berea Community Good Friday worship service as a "virtual crosswalk" through Berea. The deadline to submit images will be the end of the day on **Tuesday, March 16**.

The 7PM worship service on this day will be in a form called *Tenebrae*, or a "Service of Shadows," based on a 12th-century extended meditation on the passion of Christ. The invitation of this day is to draw near Jesus' cross and to join him, as closely as we are able, in his experience of suffering, abandonment, and death.



Holy Saturday April 3, 7PM

Holy Saturday is the third of the Great Three Days, and our worship on this day continues the service begun on Maundy Thursday and continued on Good Friday. Before the great triumph and celebration of Easter Sunday, this is a day to keep silence, to be still and know God's presence, and to remember that we are always waiting for the fullness of God's promised resurrection.

Easter Sunday April 4, 11AM

The Easter season, also know as the Great Fifty Days, begins at sunset on Easter Eve and continues through the Day of Pentecost. This is our most joyous and celebratory season and the core of the entire Christian year. Together in worship, we will focus on Christ's resurrection, the triumph of God's love over all the powers of death, and the continuing invitation to us to live as Easter people, sharing God's love with the world.





VIRTUAL MISSION TRIP TO UMCOR SAGER BROWN WEDNESDAY, MARCH 17, 2:30PM, VIA ZOOM

One of our significant and long-standing mission partnerships has been with the UMCOR Sager Brown Depot in Baldwin, Louisiana, where we have been sending mission teams every spring. The Sager Brown Depot stores, prepares, and ships relief supplies for the United Methodist Committee on Relief to communities and schools in the wake of natural disasters. It also reaches out to its local community through food distribution and housing rehabilitation projects, offering volunteers the opportunity to make a real positive difference in the lives of their neighbors.





Due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, UMCOR Sager Brown has been unable to host volunteers on campus since mid-March 2020. However, there still are opportunities for us to stay connected with the mission and ministry of Sager Brown through a "virtual mission trip" via Zoom. EQUAL EXCHANGE . . . COMPASSION IN ACTION

As you know, UMCB has supported the fair wage for farmers through purchasing Equal Exchange items for many years. In addition to our getting delicious, organically grown foods/beverages and the growers getting a fair wage, Equal Exchange (E.E.) also supports UMCOR. Another way E.E. supports communities is through its farmer cooperatives helping their local communities. For example, ACOPAGRO, one of their cocoa partners in Peru, used fair trade premium payments from E.E. to provide food, masks and cleaning supplies to co-op members in 2 different communities. Also, banana farmers at AsoGuabo in Ecuador used fair trade premiums to purchase PPE for medical workers in their community. Certainly essentials during the pandemic! Thank you for your continued support of this ministry.

UMW MISSION OF THE MONTH: LAURA'S HOME

Just over a year ago, we gathered in Fellowship Hall for a luncheon and program, sponsored by UMW. We introduced one of our new missions: Laura's Home.

Laura's Home, a part of Cleveland's City Mission, is a crisis center, for women and children...a bridge from crisis to stability and self-sufficiency. Laura's home has 166 beds and 55 rooms, with every room full and a 5-year waiting list! The center offers specialized, wrap- around services to help and empower women and families to live healthy lives. In 2019, Laura's Home housed 732 women and children, served 81,316 hot meals, and successfully found housing for 67 women and families.

Finding help, healing hearts, and empowering home. Each woman is offered the tools that are needed to gain employment, save money and secure adequate housing. Day care and schooling are available for the children, so the mother can navigate her circumstances.

UMW initially donated \$200 to Laura's Home. The luncheon's free will offering netted another \$210, which upon request, was designated for bus passes, to assist the women in getting to job interviews and children to school. At our final Circle meeting, we began our collection of deodorant, to help supply the hygiene closet at Laura's Home.

Help...heart...home. That's the mission and goal of Laura's Home.

Cambodia - The United Methodist General Board of Global Ministries in Cambodia is launching a new ministry in 2021 called the "Shine Project." Through the Shine Project, participants will receive training and licensure in trades such as cooking and cosmetology, opening avenues to economic empowerment.

Guatemala - Our Guatemalan mission supports women who live in the mountains and have little access to paid work. We help the women create small businesses. Most businesses are a single farm animal, most commonly, cattle. The women strive to produce the healthiest animals possible, including the construction of shelters to protect them. Our church funds the concrete for the floors. The women and their families provide the roofing and other materials. Our church and the women each contribute something different but "it is the same God at work." I Corinthians 12:6c (NIV).
