Palm/Passion Sunday begins Holy Week by embodying its sharp contrast. In the palm procession, we experience the joyous inaugural parade of Jesus as he enters Jerusalem. In the concluding reading of the Gospel, we are confronted by the story of Jesus' passion or suffering. By this sharp contrast, we are reminded of our various seasons of faithfulness: that our lives are filled with both suffering and joy, times of following Jesus closely and times of falling away. *Scripture focus: Psalm 118.1-2, 19-29; Matthew 21.1-11; Philippians 2.5-11; Matthew 26.14-27.66*

Maundy Thursday

On Maundy Thursday, named for the command or "mandate" from Jesus to love one another, we remember Jesus' example of servanthood and celebrate the Lord's Supper. Join us in worship in the Sanctuary at Noon for an abbreviated worship service or in the Sanctuary or online at 7 PM for a worship service including music. Both services will include Holy Communion. The 7 PM service this day concludes with the ancient practice of stripping the altar table as a dramatic demonstration of Jesus' abandonment during the events of this night and Good Friday. Our worship together on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday are celebrated as one continuous worship service. *Scripture focus: 1 Corinthians 11.23-26; John 13.1-35*

Good Friday

Good Friday is the second of the Great Three Days—or *triduum*—consisting of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday.

The noon worship service on this day will be a "cross walk" in collaboration with the Berea Area Churches. We will meet at the Kiwanis Pavilion at Coe Lake at noon, walk a short route through downtown Berea while carrying the cross and reading scripture, and conclude with a brief worship service back at the Kiwanis Pavilion beginning at 1 PM.

The 7 PM worship service will meet in our Sanctuary and include scripture and songs to help us contemplate the passion of Christ. The invitation of this entire day is to draw near to Jesus' cross and to join him in his experience of suffering, abandonment, and death.

Holy Saturday

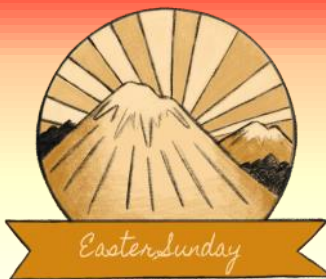

Join us for a conversation about the book, *Braiding Sweetgrass*, by Robin Wall Kimmerer. From the author's website:

Drawing on her life as an indigenous scientist, a mother, and a woman, Kimmerer shows how other living beings—asters and goldenrod, strawberries and squash, salamanders, algae, and sweetgrass—offer us gifts and lessons, even if we've forgotten how to hear their voices. In a rich braid of reflections that range from the creation of Turtle Island to the forces that threaten its flourishing today, she circles toward a central argument: that the awakening of a wider ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings will we be capable of understanding the generosity of the earth, and learn to give our own gifts in return.

SPRING & EVERY SEASON IS THE TIME TO BE GOOD STEWARDS OF GOD'S CREATION

In the United Methodist Creation Justice Movement's April Creation Justice Tips e-newsletter, they remind us that in 2023 Easter, spring and the annual celebration of Earth Day all overlap in April. God's season of spring allows new births of animals and birds and brings forth buds on trees and tulips that awaken from their slumber. Jesus was resurrected by God that reminds us of how much He loves all of His children.



All God's people can work together on Earth Day and all throughout the year to be caretakers of God's creation so we can all flourish and get closer to creating God's beloved community. In addition to the UMC East Ohio Conference's "Perspectives: Caring for God's Creation" conference being held on Earth Day, April 22nd, at UMCB, here are some other ways you can celebrate Earth Day and learn about things you can do to be a caretaker of God's creation. Everyone can do something, even something small.

- 1) 1) Sign up for the United Methodist Creation Justice Movement's [Creation Justice Tips e-newsletter](#).
- 2) 2) Learn what microplastics are and how a fifth-grade class from Brooklyn, NY studied plastic pollution and the problems it creates in the [documentary](#), Microplastics Madness, which will be screened on April 17th (7 p.m.) by event hosts Baldwin Wallace University Department of Sociology, Northeast Ohio Sierra Club and Sustainable Berea.
- 3) 3) [Recycle electronics waste](#), like cell phones, laptop or desktop computers and tablets at the Cleveland Metroparks Zoo on April 21st (10 a.m.-2 p.m.) and help protect endangered gorilla habitats – or check with your city to see if they do an electronics waste collection or take these items to [RET3 Job Corp.](#) year round.
- 4) 4) Connect with community organizations like Drink Local Drink Tap and hang out with the dinosaurs at [Earth Day Community Day](#) on April 23rd at the Cleveland Museum of Natural History.
