The beginning of the year is a wonderful time to start fresh and to reflect upon the last year. Much has been accomplished here at The United Methodist Church of Berea, so I believe we should begin the year with some encouragement. As the Apostle Paul says in 1 Thess 5:11, "Therefore encourage one another and build each other up, just as in fact you are doing." So, let's look at some of our accomplishments this year.

We have established some new ministries this year:

- Dinner Church
- Parents & Caregivers of LGBTQ youth support group
- Preschool Storytime
- Knitting Group
- Nightly Advent Prayer Service

Strengthened/Growing Ministries/Things to Celebrate: YOUTH

- Our ecumenical VBS was a huge success.
- Successful Youth Mission trip with East Ohio Conference to Charlotte, NC and Florida.
- Invitation to present at the Messy Church USA Conference, Chicago, IL.
- Feed the Kids- Ecumenical involvement in Berea.
- At the beginning of 2023, following Pastor Carrie's lead, we transformed our Homework Helpers program into onsite tutoring of K-4 students at Grindstone Elementary School. For the spring and fall sessions, we had 7 volunteers from our church working with about 30 children on math and reading skills. The program will resume in January. Teachers have been grateful for the help, and our volunteers have formed good relationships with the students.

COLLEGE MINISTRY

- The Porch (College Ministry) established an online presence.
- The Porch formed a wonderfully diverse student ministerial team.
- The Porch began new collaborations with other Christian organizations to create on-campus events.

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THE CALLER

- The Porch is reaching college students through tabling, prayer meetings, and Bible studies.
- Our church has built bridges and improved our overall relationship with Baldwin Wallace University.
- We opened up the Bread Ministry to BW students.

OUTREACH AND MISSIONS

- The following are donations that we gave to toward mission initiatives:

Total distributed to these missions is \$13,312.

- This is what we gave to 2nd Mile Outreach in goods: over 120 jars of spices, more than 120 cans of soup, baked beans and canned meat, condiments (catsup, mustard, mayo), feminine hygiene products, 50 birthday cake "packages", Thanksgiving dinner staples and monthly delivery of toilet paper.
- We have started our third season of bringing meals to homeless individuals sheltering overnight at Franklin Circle Christian Church on Fulton Rd. The seasonal shelters are called the Metanoia Project. This year there are 35 guests enrolled in the program, staying in two different areas of the church. Our volunteers from The UMCB take turns preparing food for the meal. Once or twice a month, from mid-November to mid-April, a small team takes the food to the site and serves the evening meal. Altogether we have about 20 volunteers who collaborate on the project.
- We have also given substantial support to a mission Cindie Moore has long been involved with in Guatemala, called the Association of Mam Christian Women for Development. It helps women to be more self-reliant. We have supported a nutrition program for malnourished children, as well as the addition of a sewing center to the building where the women meet.
- UMW sold plants, popcorn, and ornaments for missions.
- UMW also hosted monthly luncheons and guest speakers.
- Many in the church have been supported and encouraged by cards sent out by various groups/individuals in the church.
- Many were fed through our Bread Ministry.
- Many were ministered to and supported by our Stephen Ministers.

CREATION CARE

- We made a transition from gas operated to battery powered lawn equipment.
- We reduced paper product waste.
- We educated the congregation about creation justice topics through the Caller and The UMCB Creation Justice webpage.
- Earth Day Celebration- hosted East Ohio Conference of the United Methodist Church

MAJOR EVENTS

- Year 2 of Help Build Hope- (Framed a house for a family in need).
- Visited, donated items and painted fence pickets with Underground Railroad Codes of Freedom at Brookdale Orchard on June 3, 2023.

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THE CALLER

- Dr. Ellen Posman from the Baldwin Wallace University Religion Department visited in November and spoke about recent conflicts in the Middle East.
- Hosted a speaker on March 19, 2023: Nick Bates, Hunger Network of Ohio, who spoke about advocacy and his organization.
- Fall Fest- Local sellers and craftspeople sold their wares and the church also sold items and food for missions- hosted by UMW.

PASTORAL TRANSITION

- Welcomed a new pastor (and cared for them when they got Mono and COVID)
- Attendance has remained steady in the midst of a pastoral transition.
- A successful transition of the parsonage from Pastor Nathan to Pastor Steve.

BUILDING RELATED

- The building remains a vital part of Berea. Important community groups like Hanson House Brain Injury, Alcoholics Anonymous, Sustainable Berea and the Boy Scouts of America regularly meet here and are supported by the staff. Baldwin Wallace University, The Southwest Community Chorus and the Post Card Club also meet here.
- The Trustees continue to monitor spending and have made several cost saving measures in 2023.

Wow! I know I am probably missing some things. However, I want to say that I am so proud of all that we are doing as a church to make our community and world a better place. We have ministered to those in need. We have preached and lived out the Gospel. We have cared for those who are mourning and those who are sick. We have served faithfully. We have welcomed those who need welcomed into the church. We have loved both God and neighbor. Please understand that what you are doing is making a difference. Thank you...thank you...thank you...for your commitment to Christ. Let us all work together to make 2024 a continued success.



We are meeting just once a month offsite.




Looking to start out the new year with a new spiritual discipline?






THURSDAY BIBLE STUDY


THURSDAYS, 6:30 PM, VIA ZOOM

TLC ROOM AT BEREA MIDPARK HIGH SCHOOL

The Berea City School District serves 5,457 students in 6 school buildings across 21 square miles that includes Berea, Brook Park, Middleburg Heights, and a small portion of Olmsted Falls. Of those students, 30% of them are considered economically disadvantaged and it can be assumed that an additional group of students are hovering near that designation.



To address the needs associated with poverty, school counselors in the Berea-Midpark Middle School and High School created Titan Loving Care (TLC) rooms to "allow for our student's basic needs to be met so they can focus on learning. The rooms are confidential and available to identified students and families in need. The school counseling department maintains and manages the items in the rooms. Students are able to 'shop' for basic necessities to support their overall health and wellness."

Your support in providing for the BCSD's most vulnerable students would be greatly appreciated.

Donations can be made by purchasing items on the TLC Room's Amazon Wish list (https://www.amazon.com/hz/wishlist/ls/3KE3R10DPNZC9). The selected items will be shipped directly to the schools (please select "TLC Rooms % Sarah Hastings as your shipping address).

Additional options include buying gift cards (grocery store or Amazon - and put in the finance office mailbox) or by donating high need items (new socks, underwear, sweat suits, coats, and hygiene items) directly in the outreach bin. A list of needed items will be posted on the outreach board near the collection bin.

WHAT IS AN EARTHKEEPER?

In 2016, the Board of Global Ministries kicked off a new mission program–EarthKeepers which is a training program designed to help participants lead environmental projects in their communities. Training topics included:

- and project planning.

I participated in training in 2022 and my project was our Creation Justice Fair held in April 2022. The program is open to both clergy and laity. You must have a project in mind to participate in the training. I was inspired by the training. Each training cohort becomes part of the larger EarthKeeper community providing a great source of ideas and support.

Training is offered in the spring and late summer. The next EarthKeeper training will be **March 1 – March 16**. All training is on Zoom. There are three full group sessions, two small group sessions and one one-on-one session, for a total of 8.5 hours. There is some independent learning as well.
