

Leader: With disciples of every time and place, let us listen for the word of God among us.

People: Our ears and hearts are open.

First Lesson - Matthew 2.1-12 (NRSVUE)

2 In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, magi from the east came to Jerusalem, ² asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star in the east and have come to pay him homage."

- ³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him, ⁴ and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it has been written by the prophet:
 - 6 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah, for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the magi and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹When they had heard the king, they set out, and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen in the east, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹²And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Second Lesson - Mark 1.4-11 (*NRSVUE*)

⁴ so John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. ⁵ And the whole Judean region and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him and were baptized by him in the River Jordan, confessing their sins. ⁶ Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey.

⁷He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the strap of his sandals. ⁸I have baptized you with water, but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

⁹ In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. ¹⁰ And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove upon him. ¹¹ And a voice came from the heavens, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased."

Loving God, you have invited us time and time again to do what is good and right in your sight. To live the way that you intended us to live, in a community of peace and wholeness. You have given us every opportunity to return to you and embrace your vision.

We witness now to you now, joining our voices together and remembering your reign of peace and love and justice.

When we rejected your version of the peaceable Kingdom, instead following our own wants and desires you sent us Jesus Christ, who modeled for us through his actions and words a new path of justice and peace. Yet, we rejected him as well.

But Jesus still embraces us, as we share in this holy meal, remembering how on the night he gave himself for us in love he took bread, broke it, gave it to his disciples, and said "Eat this and remember me."

After the supper was over he took the cup, gave thanks to you, gave it to his disciples and said, "Drink this, and remember me."

So today, we gather together around the bread and the cup and remember - remember the acts of power and loving kindness expressed through our Lord, Jesus Christ as we proclaim the mystery of faith.

Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again.

Holy God, pour out your Spirit on us and on these gifts of the bread and the cup. May they strengthen us to do what you require:

to walk humbly with you, to love others, and to seek justice in the face of oppression, so we might be your people, proclaiming to others your Kingdom.
